Agir pour le Cambodge (APLC) is a French NGO created in January 1985 by former students of Lycée Franklin – St Louis de Gonzague in Paris, in response to a call from one of their Cambodian classmates to address the humanitarian emergency and help the Cambodian population in refugee camps on the Thai border. APLC shifted towards development aid in 1995 and has since contributed to reducing poverty and combating human trafficking.

Today, APLC continues to fight against poverty and human trafficking through vocational training programs (Sala Baï Hotel School) and education (supporting the Cambodian association Khmer Foundation for Justice, Peace, and Development). Its actions are exclusively directed at children and young people from disadvantaged families, particularly girls and young women, due to their greater vulnerability and limited access to education and stable employment.

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GREETING FROM CLAUDE COLOMBIÉ

Dear supporters of Agir pour le Cambodge,

The year 2023 confirmed the resurgence of tourism in Cambodia, which welcomed nearly 5.4 million foreign visitors throughout the year, compared to 2.3 million in 2022.

At Sala Baï School, this translated into a notable 20% increase in restaurant attendance, serving over 3,500 covers during its open season from November to June. The number of hotel nights increased by 12%. This allowed students to practice their hospitality training at a steady pace and in real-life conditions.

2023 also marks the first time Agir pour le Cambodge has received financial support from the Cambodian government through the Skill Development Fund Cambodia, a support fund established to assist organizations contributing to vocational training in sectors deemed priorities for the country's economic development, with tourism being one of them.

We are proud of this significant recognition, which acknowledges the commitment and work accomplished on the ground by our teams over the past 20 years, tirelessly working to develop vocational training for the country's disadvantaged youth.

Additionally, we have sought to continue the training and skill development of our teachers. In 2023, six of them benefited from several skill-sharing missions with the arrival of various chefs, including Emmanuel RYON, a Meilleur Ouvrier de France in pastry. Furthermore, our network of Ambassadors in Australia, Friends of Sala Baï Australia (FOSBA), organized and financed a two-week training course for three Sala Baï teachers at Torrens University Australia, Blue Mountains International Management School.

I would like to extend my warmest thanks for your continued support of our actions and the trust you have placed in us.

Rest assured of our commitment, both from France and on the ground in Cambodia, to continue our mission of fighting poverty and human trafficking through education, an essential vector for the development of Cambodian youth.

ECONOMIC FOCUS

Over the two decades preceding the emergence of COVID-19 in 2020, Cambodia experienced sustained catch-up growth economically. Currently, Cambodia is considered a lower-middle-income country. However, with the help of free trade agreements to support the breadth of the tourism, manufacturing, and construction sectors in the country, Cambodia is expected to graduate from the status of a Least Developed Country (LDC) by 2030.

The Cambodian government, with technical support from the World Bank, has set a new poverty threshold for the country. This new threshold is set at 10,951 riels per day (approximately 2.7 US dollars), which is just under 1,000 US dollars per year.

The country's heavy reliance on a few key sectors, the skills deficit affecting competitiveness, and the lack of infrastructure weakening connectivity are among the many challenges Cambodia must address to sustain its growth and achieve its goals for 2030.

In Cambodia, the incidence of poverty was halved in seven years, including the pandemic years (2014-2021/22).

To stimulate productivity growth in Cambodia, it is essential to address skills shortages and train a "future-ready" workforce.

Companies report an increasing skills gap.

A NEGLECTED YOUTH?

Rural and cross-border migration in search of economic opportunities is common among young Cambodians. Overall, it is estimated that young people experience more violence and abuse than any other age group, particularly in terms of domestic and gender-based violence. The levels of violence against children can have a greater impact on rural youth, where support services are limited and levels of family dysfunction are higher.

EDUCATION: A MAJOR CHAL

The World Bank's Human Capital Index indicates that a child born in Cambodia today will not be able to fully participate or contribute to the country's future prosperity due to a lack of quality education.



Access to quality education in the public system is limited, and the gap between urban and rural youth does not seem to be narrowing. Pressures, particularly in the provinces, appear to be exerted on young students in the lower secondary education cycle (LSS) to leave school to find employment to financially support their families.

Youth and vocational education represent one of the biggest development challenges in Cambodia. Unemployment stems from a lack of professional skills, leadership, critical thinking, teamwork, attitude, communication, commitment, and life skills (lifestyle, decision-making, basic hygiene), and sometimes from a lack of networks.

However, young people generally seem uninterested in vocational training offered by provincial training centers (PTCs), even when scholarships are available. Short-term technical and vocational training is often rejected in favor of seeking quick gains.

A COUNTRY MARKED BY INEQUALITIES

The Gender Inequality Index (GII) assesses inequalities between men and women by considering three factors: reproductive health, empowerment, and changes in the labor market. In 2023, the GII ranked Cambodia 116th out of 170 countries.

The United Nations Development Programme stated in a report published in March 2024 that the Cambodian parliament has made remarkable progress in this area. It calculated the share of women in parliament, in education, the workforce, and the maternal mortality rate. With 1 indicating total gender inequality and 0 indicating perfect equality, Cambodia moved from 0.679 in 1990 to 0.461 in 2023.

EMPLOYMENT OF CAMBODIAN WOMEN

Women make a significant contribution to the Cambodian economy: 62% of them have micro-enterprises, and 26% have small and medium-sized enterprises. However, they continue to face obstacles in terms of financing and registration.

The percentage of women with an account at a financial institution or mobile money service provider (as a share of the female population aged 15 and older) is 21.5%, and the share of women in senior and middle management employment is 20.1%.

PERSISTENT INEQUALITIES

Gender-based violence remains a serious problem in Cambodia. In 2022, 10% of Cambodian women aged 15 to 49, whether married or in cohabiting relationships, experienced sexual violence, and 11% experienced physical violence. Among Cambodian women aged 15 to 49 who were divorced, widowed, or separated, 93% experienced sexual violence, and 82% experienced physical violence.

Inequalities in access to education are also evident. In Cambodia in 2023, 42% of the working-age population had not completed primary school, with 58% being women and 42% being men.

In 2023, the travel and tourism sector generated 1,150,000 direct jobs (11.5% of total employment). This includes jobs in hotels, travel agencies, and leisure industries. By 2033, travel and tourism are projected to account for 1,400,000 direct jobs (13.4% of total employment).

A VOCATIONAL TRAINING PROGRAM

Sala Baï is a hospitality school, established in 2002 in Siem Reap, the second largest city in Cambodia situated between the Tonlé Sap Lake and the majestic temples of Angkor. The training allows young Cambodians from very disadvantaged backgrounds to train in one of these 5 hospitality and catering professions and sustainable agriculture. The students welcomed at Sala Baï are aged 17 to 25 years old.











All Sala Baï students come from disadvantaged families. The training of a young person and their access to decent work enable families to benefit from better living conditions and to be able to send their other children to school.


Practical training is conducted alternately. Students practice within the hotel, restaurant, and beauty center at Sala Baï School. They also put their knowledge and skills into practice during the 4-month internships they undertake at partner hotel establishments of the school.





The technical training of students is complemented by theoretical courses and general education, through which they acquire and strengthen their skills in English, mathematics, and computer science. Finally, workshops and activities are organized weekly on various topics such as gender-based violence, gender equality, sustainable resource management, environmental protection, public health issues, with one of the objectives of the training being to make students agents of change both environmentally and socially.










COMPOSITION OF THE 2022-2023 COHORT



SALA BAÏ A GREEN SCHOOL (1/2)

Since 2020, the students' curriculum has significantly enriched to diversify their skills and broaden their horizons. In a country where poverty remains prevalent in rural areas, it is more important than ever for Sala Baï students to continue making a positive impact on their community through their professional integration.





Agrisud International and their association Green Farmers take charge of the students' agricultural training, from theory to practice. The students are divided into groups for two hours of weekly agriculture training in the 800m2 garden adjacent to the dormitories. This training also aims to help transform the agricultural practices of the students' families.





Environmental protection and resource management are key components of the Sala Bai program. To raise awareness among students about ecological and sustainable development issues, numerous initiatives have been implemented.

ENHANCED MEDICAL SUPPORT AND PREVENTION OF SEXUAL ABUSE RISKS

Student health has always been a major concern for the teams. Since September 2023, a part-time nurse has been hired. Therefore, three times a week, a nurse holds consultations at the school in the infirmary built in July 2022, allowing for close monitoring of the students.

STUDY CONDUCTED IN PARTNERSHIP WITH EHL SMILE

In order to maintain the level of excellence in the training provided at Sala Baï, Agir pour le Cambodge has partnered with EHL SMILE. EHL SMILE is an association of alumni from the prestigious Lausanne Hotel School whose objective is to help promote professional training centers in hospitality and catering for disadvantaged youth in developing countries, while encouraging the development of sustainable tourism. Since September 2023, EHL Smile has been assigning a young volunteer for 6-month missions aimed at improving the training curriculum and overseeing the implementation of recommendations made during these missions. EHL Smile also assigns professors for short-term skill-based volunteering missions.

3 ESSENTIAL SKILLS AND STRENGHT LOOKED OUT FOR IN SALA BAÏ STUDENTS









EHL Smile sent two volunteers to Sala Baï: a former cooking professor from the EHL Group who thoroughly supervised the school's cooking curriculum with the 3 cooking professors for 3 weeks. The second volunteer stayed for 6 months to start a study aimed at obtaining a 360° understanding of the expectations of hotels and Sala Baï graduates regarding the training provided. The goal was to collect feedback on technical skills, soft skills, and English proficiency. This helped identify areas for improvement so that students continue to work effectively and meet the needs of their employers. It is thanks to partnerships like the one formed with EHL SMILE that the training provided at Sala Baï maintains its recognized level of excellence in the hospitality sector.






